UNION MEN OPPOSE RED CHINA

These Red China gains, which blazed at Quemoy Island in August, conveyed a grim message to our own nation. They told us that the Declaration of the Twelve Communist Principles applied to our country, made in Moscow in November 1947, was just as valid a statement. It was a fitting document, prepared for an endless series of upheavals and infiltrations, aimed at the eventual obliteration of the United States.

Now that Declaration was being put into effect, the "period of wars and revolutions" mapped out by Stalin for our time was being accelerated.

The Red maw buried at Secretary of State Dulles indicate that we are in a state of being displaced to the Soviet rulers. Since they had anticipated this sort of reaction from us, as illustrated by the constant rumors of Red harras against Mr. Dulles, we have a right to ask a question: Why did we not give some warning, and in the past we had hallooed the shelling of Quemoy, open up the conflict again?

BROWDER ON RADIO

From all the leading communist documents, we can see that there are no other answers but that they rely upon the voices raised in their behalf within the United States itself. On the evening before the new blasting of Quemoy, Friday, August 22, I was asked to make a radio broadcast on my chronic illness. Turning on the radio immediately, I was amazed to hear the voice of Earl Browder, former Secretary of the Communist Party, blaring forth not only from one station but from several in New York.

Browder was being interviewed with a show of the greatest deference. Questions being asked him as to his term in prison for traveling in behalf of the communist order, a false name, and for his failure to cooperate with our government.

Under cover of his having been called a "revisionist," Mr. Browder was speaking out boldly on behalf of the current communist line. Not only did he state that "peaceful coexistence" was possible, but he also made the center of his remarks a criticism of the recognition of Red China, financial aid by the United States to Mao Tse-tung, and the assistance by this country to all the so-called "socialist countries."

That is precisely the main goal of the Communist Party itself, to have the new extensive plans for the infiltration of American trade union. Covering the first

Washington (NC) — Red China's new and aggravated show of truculence ought to put aside for some time all talk about the recognition of the Peking regime and its assistance to the United Nations. These two moves were being proposed again, although it is difficult to say how anyone could really justify them. The plain fact is that the United States would have everything to lose and nothing to gain from such action.

Proponents of recognition and assistance have put forward such arguments as that: the Red Chinese actually control the Chinese mainland; that Chinese Nationalists on Formosa have "little chance" of regaining possession of their homeland; that trade with the Chinese government would be profitable to us. All of these contentions are based on the argument that we must be "realistic."

They attribute of this country, briefly, is that we are under no obligation to recognize Red China, recognition is a privilege we bestow on whomever we choose. On its past and present behavior, has not merited recognition by our country and many other nations. To grant these privileges would be a severe blow to the prestige of the West in all of Asia.
