The American Sokol Instructor School 2001 was held from July 23 to August 6 at Sokol South Omaha. Thirty-eight students from 13 units and D.A. Sokol studied the Tyrs system of physical education and gymnastics.

The units from which these students came should now have an excellent source of team leaders, class instructors, and perhaps a future Director of Men or Women.

In charge of Spotting and Progressions and Marching Tactics were Bros. Buddy Benak (Sokol South Omaha) and Peter Lattanzio (D.A. Sokol), and Sis. Jessica Burns (Sokol KHB). Three very capable staff members who could be found every morning outdoors in the parking lot weaving their groups through intriguing marching patterns.

Teaching Games, Methods, Rhythmics, and Folk Dancing were areas of expertise for Sis. Mary Cushing (Sokol Detroit), a veteran staff member of many schools. Calisthenics Terminology, Practice Teaching, and Singing were taught by Bro. Bob Liptak (D.A. Sokol).

Our graduation program was an exceptional exhibition with over 60 spectators in attendance, including several national executive board members. (Bros. Paul Lebloch and Gary Masek, and Sisters Val Husak, Joan Sedlacek, and Sylvia Laznovsky).

Diplomas and instructor shirts were presented to the graduates and the 2001 school ended with the usual flag lowering and three Sokol zdars!

This year's leadership awards went to Matthew Carlozzi of Sokol Greater Cleveland (Beginner School), Mark Beckerman of Sokol Greater Cleveland (Intermediate School), Jennifer Polk of Sokol Brookfield (Advanced School), and Joseph Vorlicek of D.A. Sokol (Advanced II School).

The highest scoring students in each school were: Matthew Carlozzi of Sokol Greater Cleveland for the Beginners School. A tie for the highest score awarded to Bo Benak of South Omaha, and Phillip Mancone of D. A. Sokol in the Intermediate School. Patricia Mincone of D.A. Sokol had the high score in the Advanced School and Jessica Bardy of D. A. Sokol had the high score for in the Advanced II School.

BRO. PHIL CAHOY, JR. INDUCTED INTO USA GYMNASTIC HALL OF FAME

Bro. Phil Cahoy, M.D., was inducted into the USA Gymnastics Hall of Fame at the USAG Congress in Philadelphia this August.

A product of the University of Nebraska gymnastics program, Phil Cahoy was a member of the U.S. National Team from 1978-1987. He led the Cornhuskers to the NCAA Champions team title all four years he competed for the university ((1980-1983). He is a ten-time NCAA All-American and four-time NCAA Event Champion. While competing on the U.S. National Team, he represented the USA at the 1986 Goodwill Games and the 1978, 1981, 1983 and 1985 world Championships. He also was named to the 1980 U.S. Olympic Team. He earned his B.S. in biological sciences and his M.D. graduate degree at the University of Nebraska. He completed his residency at the University of Wisconsin's Division of Orthopedics, Department of Surgery. Cahoy completed a sports medicine fellowship at the Department of Orthopedics, University of Missouri-Kansas City and with the NFL's Kansas City Chiefs, the latter where he's currently serving as their Orthopedic Consultant. Cahoy resides in Grand Island, Nebraska and is a doctor in the Grand Island Orthopedics & Sports Medicine practice. He and wife, Diana, have three children, Courtney, Steven and Kevin.

Phil got his gymnastics start at Sokol Omaha and competed in numerous Sokol competitions on his way to the top. Na Zdar and Congratulations!

A TIMELY TOPIC: **E. COLI**

E. coli O157:H7 is one of many strains of the bacterium Escherichia coli

Most strains of *E. coli* are harmless and live in the intestines of healthy animals and humans. *E. coli* O157:H7 is a strain of *E. coli* that produces a toxin and can cause severe illness.

People usually become infected with E. coli O157:H7 by eating contaminated food

The organism can live in the intestines of healthy cattle. Eating meat (especially ground beef) that is rare or undercooked is the most common way of becoming infected. Drinking unpasteurized milk and swimming in or drinking sewage-contaminated water can also cause infection. The bacteria are present in an infected person's feces and may be spread from person to person.

E. coli O157:H7 may cause severe bloody diarrhea and abdominal cramps

Sometimes it causes nonbloody diarrhea or no symptoms. Symptoms begin 3 to 8 days after exposure. Hemolytic uremic syndrome (HUS) is a serious complication that occurs in some infected people, particularly children under 5 and the elderly. In this syndrome, red blood cells are destroyed and kidney failure occurs.

Infection can be diagnosed by detecting the bacterium in the stool

Your health care provider can request a special culture for *E. coli* O157:H7 from a laboratory.

See your doctor if you think you may have this infection

Most people recover without specific treatment in 5 to 10 days. Fluid and electrolyte replacement is important when diarrhea is watery or there are signs of dehydration. Antidiarrheal agents should be avoided.

HUS is a life-threatening condition that is usually treated in an intensive care unit. If foodhandlers, health care and day care workers, children in day care, or anyone in the family of such people have an *E. coli* O157:H7 infection, they should contact their local health department to get specific recommendations.

Infection with E. coli O157:H7 can be prevented by:

- Eating only thoroughly cooked meats
- Consuming only pasteurized milk and dairy products
- Eliminating cross-contamination from raw foods to cooked ones by thorough washing of cutting boards, utensils, and hands, and by discarding used packaging
- Avoiding sewage-contaminated water
- Washing all fruits and vegetables before eating
- Washing your hands thoroughly with soap before and after handling foods, before eating, and after using the toilet or changing diapers
