Sokol Greater Cleveland Members Volunteer at the International Children's Games

2,200 athletes ages 12–15 from all parts of the world assembled in Cleveland, Ohio from July 29–August 2, 2004. This was the first time in the 36-year history of the Children's Games that the games were held in the United States. Ten sports were selected for this year's event: basketball, baseball, gymnastics, swimming, soccer, table tennis, tennis, volleyball and water polo.

The athletes were housed at various college dormitories and the competitions were held at several college campuses. Unfortunately the children from the Czech Republic canceled their participation two weeks prior to the event. However, we were fortunate to interact a little with the Slovakian athletes

A Festival Village was created in downtown Cleveland where the athletes, coaches, and parents met each evening to eat, socialize and be entertained. This was also the site of the Opening and Closing Ceremonies. President Bush met with the athletes at Browns Stadium welcoming them to the U.S. and wishing them success in their competitions.

The Greater Cleveland Sports Commission was responsible for bringing the event to Cleveland. Mike Wise was able to secure an unpaid internship with the Sports Commission from March-August. Mike was very involved in the organization and

detailed planning information of all of the sports. His dedication and leadership skills earned him the Site Manager position at the baseball venue during the games.

Alice Khol was the Facilities Manager at Cleveland State University where the basketball and swimming competitions were held. There were over 400 swimmers and over 600 basketball players.



Also volunteering at the games in various capacities were: Chyral Becka, Julie Becka, Karen Berg, Tony Berg, Carolyn Huber, George Huber, Maryann Imburgia, Georgia Jencik, Marjorie Juba, Jackie Justice, Howie Wise, and Jane Wise.

The greater Cleveland area welcomed these kids with open arms. Spectator numbers far exceeded anyone's predictions in fact, some events were limited to standing room only. Local residents visited the Festival Village during the games to interact with the athletes as well as enjoy the variety of food and entertainment that was available.

It was a wonderful experience for those of us who were able to be part of this event. The excitement of all the competitions and the enthusiasm showed by the athletes was absorbed by us all.

Plans for next year’s camp include holding it closer to the Chicago area since our campers depart immediately after the 2005 Sokol Slet. Bro. DISCIPLINE *The Real Answer?*

This article is written for Preschool Programs, but I feel that there are helpful suggestions for all levels of coaching and/or parenting! KP;)

These are common questions asked in Congress preschool round table discussions:

1. "How do I manage a preschool student's behavior?"
2. "Do you have a preschool discipline policy?"

"Managing" behavior can easily be interpreted as "controlling" children; to restrict or confine them within certain subjective behavior parameters.

A "discipline policy" sounds like a set of rules complete with punishments.

THINK: What usually happens when we try to "control" children (or adults)?

THINK: How do children (or adults) respond when slapped with rules of "if you do this ...then this will happen..." situations?

True, growing up is a constant series of choices and consequences but think... even more.

As you watch the BEST teachers-be it in gymnastics, swimming, dance, piano, or school-have you noticed the absolute finest, stand-out, respected, kick-butt teachers have very few discipline problems in their classes?

WHY? Great teachers don't dwell on the need for discipline. They tend to ignore the popular labels: 'problem child,' 'A.D.H.D.,' 'slow,' 'delayed,' 'hyper,' 'combative,' 'at-risk.' They don't point their finger at problem students. Instead, they point the finger at themselves. They concentrate on improving their own teaching abilities and the learning environment.

In gymnastics circles you'll often hear,

- "Oh no, it's a boy's class!"
- "I just have a personality conflict with that kid."
- "I hate this Monday 5:00 class. They're so hyper."
- or conversely, "I love this class. All the kids are so good."

Remember this, anyone can teach/coach the "good" kids. A true TEACHER can get through to ANY CHILD with ANY problem or limitation. That's what sets them apart from the mediocre masses. They surpass the realm of "coach/teacher" and can be considered true educators of children.

Instead of focusing on the need for discipline, great educators continually work on expanding their teaching abilities. They not only improve their knowledge of the technical aspects of their sport but even more importantly, they learn to become better communicators. I have an unshakable belief that teaching is 25% knowledge and 75% communication.

Watch the preschool teachers-or any great teacher-you know and respect. What is it that sets them apart? Probably their communication abilities. Put them in front of a group of four-year-olds and watch the magic begin. They use voice inflection. They know how to vary the tone and pitch of their voice to maintain children's interest. They know the power of a whisper and what a 'secret' means to a child. They make sound effects, imitate video game noises and cartoon voices. They're uninhibited. They'll do just about anything to make the learning process more fun for children. They communicate well and practice at it every day! That is what makes a successful teacher. Every child is different; value them, do not control them!

RETHINKING 'FORTRESS STRAHOV'

What to do with Strahov stadium? If everything goes as planned, that question, first asked in the aftermath of the 1989 Revolution when the country began to evaluate its massive, ugly communist-style structures in light of a renewed aesthetic sensibility, has finally been answered.

Over the years, the Czech soccer association's (CMFS) efforts to convince Prague city councilors to replace the crumbling stadium in Strahov, Prague 6, have met a stiff defense. However, with an assist from the Czech national team's recent Euro 2004 soccer championships qualification and the ensuing nationwide jubilation, association officials have finally netted a goal.

Thanks to a hefty dose of Euro-fever, on November 13, 2003, not long after the national team clinched its berth in the continent's biggest sporting event – and spurred by the hopes of one day hosting its own Euro championship – the city approved a proposal to build a recreational and commercial megacomplex on the site where both Strahov and neighboring Evzen Rosicky stadiums stand. While the details are still being discussed, the initial plans are to build a state-of-the-art 52,000-seat national stadium on Evzen Rosicky Stadium-occupied land, and to convert the mammoth

Strahov stadium complex into a commercial zone complete with hotels, restaurants and shops.

The proposal, engineered by soccer association president Jan Obst, stipulates that private investors will fund the new stadium's 4.5 billion Kc (\$167 million) price tag. The state will contribute about 1 billion Kc from an already established sports grant, as well all of the land.

Since the announcement, city and CMFS officials have been reluctant to reveal any additional details about the stadium's financing or its eventual construction, saying nothing is certain the preliminary agreement is signed later this year, according to CMFS spokesman Daniel Macho. Indeed, most of the talk surrounding the new stadium has centered on one issue: the Czech Republic's chances of landing the European championship.

"We are thinking positively [about getting the tournament]," said a cautious but optimistic Jaroslav Vacek, CMFS vice president.

Other officials have an even more ambitious outlook. Prague city councilor Pavel Klega, the main contact between City Hall and CMFS, predicted that the new complex could be the first step toward an eventual Olympic bid.

But if the Czech Republic is

serious about landing a major sporting event anytime soon, it's going to need at least one more large 50,000+ stadium and a couple of smaller 30,000-seaters, as well as some major infrastructure work to support the accompanying influx of fans and media, Klega said.

A giant problem

Sprawled along a former rock quarry behind Petrin hill – on the site literary historians have determined the luckless K. met his untimely death in Kafka's novel *The Trial* – mammoth Strahov stadium looks more like an antiquated Roman facade than a center of Czech recreation.

Originally constructed by the country's founders as a place to hold nationalistic rallies, in 1948 the communists expanded it to its current brobdignagian size. Occupying more than 6 hectares (15 acres) and with a capacity of 220,000, Strahov has been home to Czech Sokol competitions, communist Spartakiada exhibitions, Rolling Stones concerts and, currently, Sparta Praha soccer team's training facilities. The compound is an enduring if not endearing testament to Czech history.

Every couple of years talks resurface about what to do with

the aging giant, but architects soon find themselves overwhelmed by its sheer size and city engineers by its legacy of historical significance. Revitalization suggestions have ranged from the predictable, another stadium, to the practical, a supermarket and daycare center.

The closest the building came to a true renovation was in late 1998, when architecture firm AG Studio developed an ambitious plan to create a compound *The Prague Post* referred to at the time as "a leisure mecca for the 21st century." But the plan eventually succumbed to

numerous obstacles, among them the realization that the mammoth structure was just too big and would be too costly to raze.

A stadium for the people

Despite the ambitious goal of bringing international competitions to Prague, those close to the project maintain that the stadium's ultimate purpose will be to provide Czechs with a much-needed venue for national events.

"Of course the new stadium won't be constructed only for the world Football Championship," city

councilor Klega said.

"Its realization will be a socially favorable project that can boost an important area in the city center."

Perhaps the most notable aspect of the whole project is the seeming lack of opposition. City councilors agree that approval was unanimous, and even the historical preservationists have been unusually quiet.

The reason for such seemingly universal approval, Macho suggests, is that because the project is still in its infancy, there is really nothing to oppose — yet.

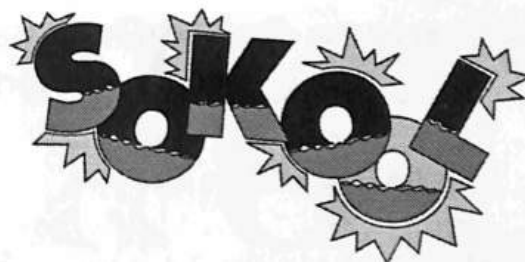

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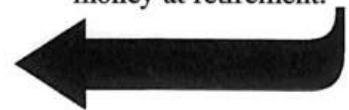
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
